Understanding NIL and your taxes



Name, Image, and Likeness (NIL) deals have quickly taken the school-sports world by storm. With such a quick rise in use, it's only natural that questions about the tax implications would follow. One of the most common tax questions arising from using NIL deals is whether student-athletes earning NIL income can still be claimed as dependents. Learn more about NIL and taxes in this guide.

## What do you need to know when your child accepts NIL income, and what are the unintended tax consequences?

- Parents that claim their student athlete dependents on their annual tax return may no longer be able to do so.
- Student athletes that have never filed a tax return in their young adult lives are now responsible for timely filing and paying their federal and state taxes.
- Many of the dependent tax benefits a parent uses to reduce their taxable income are no longer available to you.
- A student athlete may receive less financial aid from FAFSA because their income has increased from NIL deals.

## 4 things you should do as a parent of a student athlete:

- Educate yourself about the affects of NIL by talking to a tax professional.
- Help your child keep track of any expenses related to the NIL income.
